GIFH Specific Updates

How are practices that have submitted for a GIFH award assessed?

The deadline for submission for 2024 green Impact awards was 30th September. We received 184 submissions including groups of practices. Congratulations to all practices who submitted their toolkit.

The RCGP funds a maximum of 50 in depth student-led audits supported by SOS-UK. These 50 student-led audits were conducted by students from the University of Salford undertaking a Standards & Auditing MSc module and have largely now been completed.

These are mostly for the higher value awards Platinum and Gold. All the other 168 have spot checks on the comments and evidence they provide to show they have completed actions/criteria. The spot checks look at engagement in the process e.g. have the practice provided useful comments and/or sufficient evidence of achieving the actions/criteria. The spot checks are not a forensic examination of all the comments and evidence. This is a high trust process and practices are usually given the benefit of the doubt about some missing information in their applications. We want to provide positive feedback to practices as they become more sustainable and low carbon practices.

Whether you had a student-led audit, or a spot-check review, you should hear the outcome by the end of November, or early December. Thank you for your patience while we review everything and finalise results.

A few practices who submitted for an award provided no or very few comments or evidence to support most of the actions they report they have achieved. Whilst there is no need to enter comments or evidence in the toolkit to support achievement of an award when the toolkit is only being used as a checklist to prompt actions, if the practice does want to be rewarded with an award, then it is necessary to add comments and/or evidence of achievement to gain recognition for an award.

If any practice feels aggrieved that they have not received an award that matches their documented achievements, we are happy to reassess their application and give detailed feedback on their submission.

We also would like to apologise to any practises that did not have a positive experience with their auditor and thank you for your patience working with them. The auditors are

We will be reviewing how we select auditors next year, and how we can place stronger emphasis on professional conduct in the training. We will also be providing feedback to the students and their module leader. Please rest assured we will be moderating all the audits and will ensure that each practise is given an accurate award outcome.

The Planetary Health Report card 2023/24

This has the purpose of increasing planetary health awareness and accountability among medical schools, the <u>Planetary Health Report Card (PHRC)</u> was developed as an institutional advocacy tool in 2019 by a group of medical students at the University of California, San Francisco School of Medicine. The PHRC is a student-driven metric-based tool that aims to evaluate health professional schools on discrete metrics in five main category areas: 1) Curriculum, 2) Interdisciplinary research in health and environment, 3) Community outreach and advocacy 4) Support for student-led initiatives and 5) Campus sustainability.

The 2024 Summary report of primary care net zero work at ICB level
